London Plan: Characterisation Studies

- Characterisation studies are developing into very useful planning tools. They have evolved from the landscape and heritage management techniques that influenced past practice.
- These studies act as a helpful evidence base in supporting the London Plan's
 promotion of proactive planning i.e. to identify areas for tall buildings, to inform growth
 strategies and to assist housing land availability studies.
- There should be clarity on what characterisation studies will be used for right from the start and this should inform how they are devised. However, don't be surprised if you find they can be functional across different council departments in ways not initially foreseen – users need to be involved and have full access to outputs.
- Cross-borough consistency in the collection and labelling of base level information such as identifying which areas are designated to stay the same, change slightly or grow
 could be useful.
- There are three core elements of character physical, social and historical. Studies need to be comprehensive, locally based and informed by people's perception of their areas. They should not make assumptions of quality from GIS data alone.
